We continue to do monthly onboardings for new volunteers. This is part of our National Safeguarding Policy requirements. All Conference members, board members, and volunteers must complete this training prior to volunteering at any of our locations.

We want to say thank you to all of our volunteers for all your hard work and dedication to our mission. We can't do it without you. We welcome anyone who has a few hours to give.

St. Vincent de Paul Food Pantries

St. Vincent de Paul Des Moines (SVdP) has two food pantries that both sit in what use to be called a "food desert." The definition of a food dessert is an urban area in which it is difficult to buy affordable or good -quality fresh food. Fortunately, SVdP worked to address the problem with Polk County leadership.

Between both locations, clients have access to food six days a week. On average, each pantry serves at least 15 households a day. Clients can receive food, clothing, personal hygiene or household items that they are in need of at absolutely no cost to them. Clients are able to access food and one other service(personal hygiene, household, or clothing) at their appointments.

The need for serving individuals in need of food only continues to grow. On average between our two pantries, we serve close to 1600 individuals a month. As the need for assistance has increased, so has the cost of food. It was recently stated that the cost of food has increased 3% last month alone. We are grateful for the Conferences that continue to support our pantries monetarily on a monthly basis. We are also grateful for the Conference members who donate eggs and make the bread runs on a weekly basis, and volunteer in our pantries. We could not do it without all of you!

We are grateful to the different Food Rescue partners that we pick up food from on a daily basis. That helps cover some of the needs of our clients. We also receive fresh produce once a week from Capital City Produce which provides clients healthy options.

Our staff works hard to address the needs of the clients that come through the doors of SVdP.Over 65% of our clients are a dual income home. Over 40% of our clients also receive SNAP (Food Stamps) monthly. Clients can make an appointment 15 days after their last appointment.

Staff is able to work with participants and help them get the resources they need to become self-sufficient. Many of the clients that have come to our pantries have also ben funneled into our Immersion and Back2Work programs just from the conversations with the staff in regards to their current situations. This shows how SVdP is helping others work towards self-sufficiency.



Introducing Tonya Gordon, our new Director of Community Services

My name is Tonya Gordon and I am excited to join the St. Vincent de Paul team as The Director of Social Services. A primary role of my position will be overseeing social service programs such as Back 2 Work, Immersion, and the Food Bank. I also look forward to engaging in community outreach to enhance and establish partnerships and support.

My background in the field of social services has been in various professional roles such as mental health counseling and rehabilitation, family advocacy, career counseling, and mentoring. I am thrilled to be part of an organization also driven by a desire to support self-sufficiency, empower communities, and create opportunities for positive change.


When I am not serving in this new role, I can be found thrifting (at St. Vincent of course), trailriding and camping with my horses, and working on home improvement projects. The goal of the Back2Work (B2W) Program is to help unemployed or underemployed individuals work their way toward self-sufficiency using a wholistic learning approach. Through classroom learning, internships, and individualized case management individuals will be ready to be successful in the workplace as well as the other components of their life. The ultimate hope of the B2W program is self-sufficiency for our clients, thereby fulfilling the primary mission of St. Vincent de Paul. Following each classroom experience, participants will either complete an internship or proceed to direct employment depending on their individualized career plan. If participants complete a four-week internship, they are putting into practice what was taught during the classroom experience. If they choose direct employment, they continue to meet with the classroom facilitator and give progress updates.

SVdP has employer partners who we work with, based on what participants are interested in. SVdP program, partners with over thirty Employer Partners that place our participants in their organization. We have had great success with several of our Partners who have hired our participants long-term. Back2Work facilitators follow-up with all participants and their employers following program completion. Data is collected for up to one year following the program. Data shows that in two of the groups since in-person B2W restarted, all the participants that completed class are now employed at a livable wage. Long-term data shows a strong completion rate of the participants that enrolled into the class, as well as a majority of participants maintaining employment for a significant period of time following the classroom portion of B2W.

During fiscal year 2024 Back2Work has hosted 6 full classes. 93% of the participants are either working or continuing their education or both. Over half were offered direct employment. Others completed internships and were either offered employment at that time or were coached in supervised job search. The program continues to have great outcomes and successful participants who are able to become self-sufficient.



Second chances are very important at SVdP. Not only do we provide second chances for the items sold in the retail store, but we also provide second chance services for those who have been affected by incarceration and their families. Our Immersion Reentry program, which is Nationally replicated, has expanded not only the number of participants enrolled in the program, but also expanding where we provide services. Immersion staff now makes monthly appearances at the Polk County Jail, Ankeny Community Connection Center, Beacon of Life (women's residential program) Catholic Charities Emergency Family Shelter, lowa Correctional Institution for Women and the Newton Correctional facility. Staff are available to determine clients' needs and to help them navigate through obstacles to gain the necessary resources. We are always looking for volunteers. Newsletter Update for Conferences

As the SVDP Conference Liaison, my job is to provide support from the council to the fourteen Des Moines area conferences. I help by attending conference meetings a few times per year to answer questions, offer clarifications, provide ideas for recruitment, create documents that may help make their work easier and encourage them to be the best they can be.

I have focused the last several months on the spiritual and friendship values which are two of the three core values of SVDP. The third is service, which happens easily when a conference is grounded in friendship and spirituality. When there is trust among the members and they are grounded in Gospel values, they know and believe that they are called to serve the poor and the good works of the conference flow from these values.

St. Vincent de Paul USA's new National President, John Berry, is focusing on a two year effort called Vision SVdP, a series of listening sessions to help our Society move forward for future generations. There will be much more to come.

The quarterly breakfasts, the monthly president's meetings, and the support of the liaison has helped our conferences stay connected, be consistent and feel appreciated for all they do in their parish and in the community. We have created a best practices list to help conferences achieve excellence in how they operate and how they serve the poor.

We have two major challenges ahead. One is to get more parishes in the Des Moines area to have a SVDP conference, while the second challenge is recruitment. I have had the wonderful opportunity to speak to parish committees to give an overview of SVdP. It always surprises me to find out how many folks in our community do not know about SVdP not only at the parish level, but they don't know about our thrift stores, donation pick up, or the programs that SVdP offers. From these presentations we have not only educated those present about our Society, but we have also recruited new membership.

Invite, invite, invite! The best and proven way to get new members is to talk about the good works of the conference with your friends and parishioners. A personal invitation continues to be the best way to get new members. The first step is to ask someone to help you with a project. If they liked it, ask again. If they seem engaged, invite them to come to a meeting with you to hear about all the other projects that are happening and see if they want to get more involved. It is better to invite to a project rather than invite to a committee meeting. It is also important for members to know about all the projects and programs that are happening at the council level so they can share with folks that SVDP is not just a parish program, it is also a community, national and international program reaching out and helping folks in need across the world.
